Anderson, Robert Henry (1885-1969)
Botanist for 43 years in the service of the Royal Botanic Gardens and National Herbarium, Sydney, eventually as Director, till 1964. Author of Trees of New South Wales; founder of Contributions from the New South Wales National Herbarium in 1939, and of the Flora of New South Wales. Obituary by J.W.Vickery, Contr. N.S.W. Herb. 4 (1972) 245-249 + portr.

Blake, Dr. Stan died suddenly at his home, Febr. 24, 1973. This is a heavy blow to the Queensland Herbarium and equally so to Australian botany. Dr. Blake was an outstanding systematist with a huge experience and knowledge, whose meticulous work on various difficult families and genera (grasses, sedges, Plectranthus, Eucalyptus, etc. etc.) was deeply admired by his colleagues. Dr. Blake had a singularly critical vision on systematic work which in many cases induced him to shelve problems instead of publishing, which led to a huge backlog of work; but he refrained from publication until he felt completely satisfied for himself that he had mastered situations. Several of us felt, that his measuring of this point, with which each systematist is faced and which each has to decide on for himself, led in his case to hyperperfectionism. Be it as it is, his work was of the highest standard thinkable. And we had hoped that he would be able to round off his many MSS. during his retirement. Unfortunately Fate decided otherwise. I remember vividly a most agreeable botanical excursion which I attended to Mt. Glorious in 1950 in which he introduced me to the Queensland flora and from which I derived great profit. - Van Steenis.

B o r, Norman Loftus (4.V.1893-22.XII.1972) The well-known forester turned agrostologist, who during his retirement worked at the Kew Herbarium on grasses of tropical Asia. Obituary by K.C.S. in the Indian Forester 99 (1973) 185-186 + phot.

Deschamps, Louis Auguste On his work in New Caledonia: A.Guillaumin in Bull. Mus. Hist. Paris iii, 47 (1972) Bor. 85-87.

Donk, Marinus Anton (14.VIII.1908-2.IX.1972)
Mycologist and nomenclature expert of worldwide repute, who
was Keeper of the Herbarium Bogoriense between 1947 and
1955, when he also worked on ferns, and founded Reinwardtia
with its excellent editorial design. From 1956 until his
sudden death of a kidney ailment, he was head of the mycol-

ogy department of the Rijksherbarium. He founded <u>Persoonia</u>, which he shaped into a mycological journal of top standing. In 1962 he became a member of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Sciences. A sensitive personality, always ready to share his vast knowledge with those who were interested, he is still deeply missed. He brought about considerable innovations in the science, and left a rich legacy of material, books and pamphlets to the institutes where he worked. Steenis, C.G.G.J.van
On the occasion of his retirement on 22 September 1972, volume 20 of Blumea was dedicated to him. It contains two biographical papers. The first is by Mrs. M.J.van Steenis-Kruseman, The life of a botanist, pp. 1-6, plus a portrait of him and F.W.Went botanizing, taken about 1918. A personal and loving, but not uncritical account, full of interesting facts, concisely told. The second paper is by M. Jacobs, Lines in the published work of C.G.G.J.van Steenis, tropical botanist, pp. 7-24, 6 fig. Here are expounded the main subjects and leading ideas, under citation of his most

important publications. Considered are plant areas; fact finding; discontinuity among plant forms; vegetation and ecology; man, nature, education; discontinuities in plant distribution; taxonomy in the strict sense. Much authentical biohistorical material can be found in a 37-page booklet in English edited by M.M.J.van Balgooy, Steenisiana. Twenty authors contributed 36 anecdotes. A short paper by P.W.Leenhouts, Professor C.G.G.J. van Steenis, was published in Tropical Ecology 13 (1) (1972) 1-4 + portr.
